Save the Date for the Fall Frolic 60th Anniversary Celebration

Join the Lawrence Hidden Valley Board Committee, Friends of Hidden Valley members, families and guests, and Girl Scouts from Douglas County on Saturday, September 24, 10:00 to 2:00 for a pollinator themed Fall Frolic through Hidden Valley Camp. We are planning activities and displays throughout the camp to celebrate the 60th Anniversary of the camp and a dedication of Dogwood Forest.

Many improvements and additions have happened at Hidden Valley during the last 10 years, since we celebrated the 50th Anniversary. We will be highlighting these and the volunteers responsible. Many of these improvements are in Dogwood Forest, which has been transformed into an adventure area that is sure to delight! The cabin, Arcalooka, has received a facelift with a new roof, windows, skylights, furnaces, counters and cupboards, as well as chimney replacement through the Brick 4 Bricks fundraiser, and a Memorial Pathway. Evelyn's Attic has a new roof, windows and paint. We also now have two new campsites, two zip lines and an archery range that are very popular.

An abbreviated FHV Members Annual Meeting and election of new Board members will follow the ceremony. This is different than previous years in which we met on the third Thursday of September. Girl Scout individuals, troops, and leaders are the backbone of how we engage young leaders. The Friends of Hidden Valley assures that Girl Scouts are recognized for their contribution to Hidden Valley and leadership development. Ambassador Girl Scout Dani McEathron was presented the Friends' Mariana Remple Recognitions Award, with her essay "Why I Love Hidden Valley". She will use the \$150 award to attend a National Youth Leadership Training this year. A quote from her essay read, "I love Hidden Valley because it has impacted me through its beauty and memories. I value work days because maintenance is required to conserve Hidden Valley and it pays off in authentic preservation of the camp's beauty." Two Junior troops led by Emily Malin and Mindie Padget were awarded the Friends Troop Rewards of \$50 each, for their service to Hidden Valley Camp. According to them, Hidden Valley is "definitely a FUN place to go and it has much to explore."

Right: The creation of Dogwood Forest began in 2007, with clearing the woods and building this 30' diameter yurt. Other improvements were a girl-built tree house, fire rings, a large storage shed with composting toilets, and a climbing tower. Stream bank stabilization projects, native woods restoration, and the creation of a flowering bioswale were made possible from the Elizabeth Schultz Environmental Fund and several anonymous donors.
