Large Fireplace & Grill Coming NOW to Southern Shade Shelter

Thanks to your contributions to our ongoing Brick 4 Bricks fundraiser, a grant from the Kriz Charitable Foundation, and The Friends of Hidden Valley, our long-term dream of having a large fireplace and grill at Southern Shade Shelter has come alive. Concrete has been poured and stone work is beginning. The project includes a new roof extending over the fireplace, with any remaining funds

going towards a new water source, food prep or serving counter, and seating. Work will hopefully be complete in November. This new shel-

Looking for a fundraiser? Biochar, made from burning woody biomass down to charcoal, is an up and coming trend in gardening. Small bags sell for about \$12.00 in local nurseries! The Forest Service has suggested selling biochar at Farmers' Markets to spread awareness of this new, yet ancient product! At Hidden Valley, we burn our invasive honeysuckle shrubs down to biochar and use it around the camp in plantings, trails, and erosion control.
