



Friends of Hidden Valley (FHV) continued providing support to the Hidden Valley Camp through our four regular workdays, several other special projects and fundraising during the 2017-2018 year. The FHV 2017 Annual Meeting was held on September 21, 2017. Copies of the Annual Report were provided and ballots were counted for the election of the slate of new Board Members. The returning members elected were Karen Lewis, Durand Reiber and Marcia West for 3 year terms; Lily Yu for a 1 year term and new member Brigid Murphy for a 3 year term. The 20th Anniversary of the founding of the FHV was celebrated in conjunction with the meeting. Founding and Charter members were invited and those attending were recognized. Mary Beth Petr awarded Gwen Macpherson as an Honored Friend and unveiled her name on the Honor Bench.

The contributions from our membership were strong again at over \$12,000. The Membership committee reports a total of 130 members. Other income came from the Brick 4 Bricks program, Cans for the Community donation, the Breakfast Optimist donation, and AmazonSmile donations. This enabled us to fund several projects throughout the camp. One major project was the removal of invasive honeysuckle and vegetation renewal, for which a little over \$6,000 was spent. Another \$1,800 was spent on the camp through volunteer and camp expenses to maintain the camp.

The Public Relations committee serves to spread awareness about Hidden Valley Camp and the Friends organization through public outreach, social media and newsletters. Three outreach events that FHV participated in were Eagles Day, Earth Day and National Trails Day.

FHV recognize Girl Scouts and Troops by presenting the Troop Rewards and the Mariana Remple Recognition Award. These recognitions are given to encourage volunteerism, commitment and responsibility for the stewardship of Hidden Valley Camp for now and in the future. The Troops honored this year were Daisy Troop 3008, Brownie Troop 5606, and Cadette Troop 7611. The Mariana Remple Recognition Award was given to Ruby Hoffer of Cadette Troop 7611.

The Volunteer Committee organizes volunteer efforts at the camp, primarily through routine workdays and the Hiking Patrol. FHV provide planning, tools, oversight and refreshments for workdays, which draw volunteers of all ages and from all walks of life. This year the 4 workdays and the Hiking Patrol brought in about 380 volunteers, resulting in an estimated 1,050 hours of service.

The goals for FHV for the 2018-2019 year are:

- --Continue working with the LHVC Site Committee to fine tune the plans for the Southern Shade Fireplace/Grill and procure funding for it
- --Contribute to funding of the major bridge in Mary's Meadow which was recently closed for safety reasons
- --Continued native woods restoration
- --Adding contributions to the Yurt Nature Center displays



Southern Shade Fireplace & Grill Project

Imagine, Think, Ponder...

Wouldn't it be wonderful to have a fireplace in our open-air shelter, Southern Shade? *Imagine* the glowing, inviting flames of a fire warming Hidden Valley guests on chilly nights. *Think* about groups of Girl Scouts working together to build a fire and cook under the protective roof of the shelter. *Ponder* the possibilities of gathering with other Hidden Valley friends while roasting marshmallows or cooking for a large event. A sub-committee from FHV and LHVC has taken on this long-range goal and has begun working on a plan to build a fireplace at one end of an expanded Southern Shade Shelter. The project would include an 8 x 20' concrete slab, a fireplace with grill, and a fire-retardant roof structure. Depending on funding, the old, existing roof of wooden shakes could be replaced and incorporated into a new roof encompassing the entire structure. It is also hoped that additional improvements to Southern Shade could include a water source with spigot, drinking fountain, a sink/preparation area, and new seating, to complement the new fireplace and provide a convenient place for prepping and serving food, as well as cleanup.

A fireplace at this shelter would be especially useful during summer day camp, when inclement weather oftentimes prevents campers from building fires and cooking their planned meals. The proposed 4' wide firebox would allow several people to cook safely at one time and thus prepare meals for large groups.



We are now in full fund-raising mode to make this a reality! We are in touch with local architects and contractors that can help us through the design and construction process, and are in the process of applying for grants. Individual donations for this project are also greatly needed and appreciated!
