Day Camp 2018: it's all about the FUN!



"Blast from the Past" was the theme of Hidden Valley Girl Scout Day Camp, held the second and third weeks in June. Nearly 250 campers, aides, and volunteers participated in the fun each week. Campers wearing brightly colored t-shirts (representing the warm colors of a campfire) spent their days hiking, building and tending fires, cooking meals, singing, playing games, and learning how to work together. Painting rocks with pigment derived from natu-



ral materials and participating in challenges were special activities enjoyed by younger campers. More experienced girls tried archery and zip lining. One Junior scout shared that zip lining was scary at first but, once you go down, is worth it! She was proud of herself for overcoming her fear of heights and accomplishing personal goals during day camp. A whole-camp activity was the construction of several tunnels using honeysuckle cut by the Honeysuckle Warriors! Congratulations and thank you to our amazing camp director Lysette DeBoard and the many dozens of volunteers who make this wonderful experience possible for local Girl Scouts!











April Showers ... or freezing rain?!

Despite threats of "wind chill" temperatures and freezing rain, 83 hearty volunteers showed up at camp on Saturday, April 14 for our Spring Workday. The work began in the morning with 14 KU Big event volunteers. By the end of the day all of the volunteers were able to complete the planting of 90 saplings, clean up areas on the east side of camp, cut back dead stalks and cedar branches, dig up cactus, mullein and sumac, and clean up litter. The gutters on Evelyn's Attic were even cleaned out.

The trees and shrubs planted for native woods restoration were ordered from the Kansas State Forest Service. They included Mulberry, Shellbark Hickory and Hazelnut trees; the shrubs were False Indigo, Serviceberry, and Spicebush. There were also about 50 cuttings of Elderberry plants that were harvested from our own camp and planted along stream banks. Several native grasses mixed with annual rye were spread along with wildflower seeds harvested from camp and some squaw weed flowers to provide ground cover throughout wooded areas.

A new technique was implemented this spring using the "biochar" left in the fire rings from the numerous Honeysuckle Warriors burning events over winter. It was used to mix with the mulch, placed in the bottom of planting holes and for use in stream stabilization projects, due to its' water holding capacity.

Hidden Valley Trails Day 2018



For 25 years, National Trails Day® has united the trails community on the first Saturday of June with the goal of connecting more people to trails and public lands.

On June 2, 2018, Friends of Hidden Valley hosted a Trails Day event in conjunction with its summer workday at Hidden Valley campsite. There were 22 volunteers (including two Girl Scout troops) that came out to work the trails. Preparing the campsite for summer day camp at Hidden

Valley could not have happened without the sweat and diligence of these volunteers.

After the work, guided hikes were offered to the scouting and Lawrence community, lead by birders, photographers, prairie plant ecologists and Hidden Valley historians. Twenty-five



hikers arrived for this activity, including some from Presbyterian Manor.

Friends of Hidden Valley is grateful for every individual who pitched in to leave a trail better than they found it as well as the guides and hikers who took the time to explore our treasured campsite. It was a great opportunity for people to try something new, explore wild spaces, or get outside right in their neck of the woods—or city!

Earth Day 2018 in South Park


